## **Strengthening Sterilization Services through Outreach** and Collaboration



Family planning empowers young people to make informed decisions about pregnancy planning and contraceptive use by enhancing their knowledge of reproductive and sexual health.

Through its large-scale service delivery programs, World Health Partners (WHP) has created easy access to good quality health and reproductive healthcare covering a range of services including family planning. In April, 2024, 267 female sterilizations and 01 nonscalpel vasectomy (NSV) were done across the intervention states of Bihar, Jharkhand and Uttar Pradesh. The total number of beneficiaries who utilized these services was 5,132. To provide family planning services, World Health Partners has entered into a formal agreement with the respective states, which allows it to utilise the infrastructural  $% \left( 1\right) =\left( 1\right) \left( 1\right) \left($ facilities and medical instruments in the primary health facilities. ## nated alert system for Community Health Officers (CHOs)

WHP has developed a mechanism for Automated Calls and Message Alerts (ACMA), a supporting tool for community health officers (CHOs) with a pivotal role in managing nsuring improved treatment outcome in TB patients. This alert system helps in nsuring periodic screening of TB patients, referral of the presumptive TB patient to rimary health centre for complete diagnostic evaluation.
